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Get January Off to a Great Start!

The last 2 years have been extraordinary. We have all been through a lot and have had to make changes, be creative, and deal with a lot of stress.

Creating an environment that has consistency and predictability will help everyone get off to a great start after the holiday break:

- Remind everyone of the schoolwide expectations and the behaviors that are expected in different settings around the school.
- Use acknowledgments heavily in the first few weeks to encourage students to follow the expectations (and help the adults remember the expectations too!).
- If teachers aren't using PBIS practices in the classroom yet, this might be a great time to give them training, guidance, and support to create a classroom matrix and teach and reinforce behaviors for settings within their classroom. (Check out our <u>Tier I Training Modules</u>, Module 13: PBIS in the Classroom.)
- If you have office referral data from previous years, check for patterns and create a plan to head off common behaviors or prevent problem areas that have been an issue in the past.

Be sure to check out the two great resources below. The first is a podcast by PBISApps on strategies for welcoming students into the classroom. The second is an updated practice guide from the National PBIS Center that summarizes evidence-based, positive, and proactive practices that support and respond to students' social, emotional, and behavioral needs in classrooms and similar teaching and learning environments.

Becoming a champion- The teacher's voice

Fellow educators, our voices matter. We have the ability to create positive change for each of our students. Rita Pierson stated, "Every child deserves a champion, an adult who will never give up on them, who understands the power of connection, and insists that they become the best that they can possibly be (Holine, 2018)." Becoming a champion requires more than going to work 7:30-3:30 every day. It requires gaining knowledge regarding educational policy, seeking leadership opportunities, and speaking up for our students.

According to a 2018 Gallup Panel survey, 42% of teachers said that they have little to no input in their school's decision-making process. The same survey found that 93% of teachers believe they should have a great deal of input in the school's decision making (Hodges, 2018). How awful it must be to work in a school where teachers feel their voice and opinions are unimportant or taken into consideration. A successful school is built on positive relationships where all stakeholders feel heard and valued.

Teachers are the backbone of the school district. We are the professionals that work daily to meet and assess the needs of each individual student. We are the experts. Educational policy should be decided utilizing a diverse population of individuals without money or school report cards being at the forefront of many conversations. We should ask ourselves, "What is best for OUR students?"

Teachers, let's work harder to become champions for our students. We can begin by learning more about what's happening on a local, state, and federal level regarding education. We can stay up to date with the commissioner's memos. We can contact our legislators with concerns and feedback. We can attend committee meetings. In our school districts, let's strive to volunteer on committees where our voices will be heard and lead when the opportunities arise. Yes, it will take a little more research, and require some after school hours, but it will benefit you and your students.

Our voices matter. Our opinions matter. The future of our students matters.
